

40. HUBBARD BLACKMAN ⁶ BURTON (*Nathaniel*⁴, *Josiah*³, *Benjamin*², *Solomon*), born in St. Albans, Vt., about 1789, died in Milwaukee, Wis., 25 Aug. 1850. He married in Cleveland, Ohio, in July 1834, ABIGAIL-WILDER BALL, born in Northborough, Mass., 12 Jan. 1816, died in Milwaukee, 1 Sept. 1850, daughter of John and Eunice (Merrifield) Ball.

Hubbard-Blackman Burton was a vessel captain, and lived in Cleveland and Milwaukee. With his brother, William Burton, he at one time owned half of Manitou Island in Lake Michigan.

41. WILLIAM ⁶ BURTON (*Nathaniel*⁴, *Josiah*³, *Benjamin*², *Solomon*), born in Fairfax, Vt., 11 June 1792, died probably in Wisconsin, 31 May 1872, aged eighty years. He married in St. Albans, Vt., 3 Jan. 1816, his stepsister, LUCY-BOYD RICE, born in Marlborough, Mass., 5 Aug. 1798, died in Green Bay, Wis., 12 June 1881, aged eighty-three, daughter of Elisha and Lucy (Boyd) Rice.

William Burton was in Glen Arbor, Mich., about 1850; from there he removed to Cleveland, and was in Milwaukee in 1868. He also lived for a time in Buffalo, N. Y., and for many years in Vermont. The First Congregational Church Manual of Manchester, Vt., states that a William Burton was dismissed on 19 Dec. 1840, to the Presbyterian Church of Cohoes, N. Y.

According to family letters it is evident that from Vermont William Burton apparently went to Ohio City (Cleveland), and while living "on the lakes" (Mich.), and in Buffalo, he still maintained his residence in Cleveland. His farm in Michigan burned in April 1850, and in a letter of his stepmother's, Lucy (Boyd) (Rice) Burton, she states that after the conflagration, William and his family went to their "cottage in Ohio City."

In regard to the family records:

"Milwaukie Mar 21st 1868

Cousin Wm B. Sir

. . . cannot sister Hannah give you some information upon the Subject also she may know something of sister Louisas birth Marriage and death who married Wm Webb of New Albany Indiana she was probably married about

1850 and she died I think in 61 or 62. Hannah had a letter from Mr. Web which if preserved will show the date of her death I have now on the Island, you will probably get Hubbards family from his son George B. residing in Cleveland. . . . Remember me & wife to Hannah and family when you see them.

"P.S. My daughter Eunice enclosed me your letter requesting me to make out her record you will see that I have said but little about her first husband of whom she obtained divorce 5 years since, when she married him he was one of the first men on the lakes perfectly temperate but he went into expensive house building and Propeller building and run though a handsome property and left him largely in debt it wore upon him and like many other foolish men to drown sorrows took to drink and become a drunkard neglected his family they lived with me 6 or 7 years untill last June she married her present husband a wealthy farmer of good habits and kind to her and the Children she and her two little daughters now have a good home.

42. HANNAH * BURTON (*Nathaniel⁴, Josiah³, Benjamin², Solomon*), born in St. Albans, Vt., 22 Mar. 1796, died in Manchester, Vt., 8 Apr. 1874. She married in Manchester, 11 Jan. 1817, MARINUS-WILLETT HOLLISTER, born in Lenox, Mass., 14 Mar. 1785, died in Manchester, 21 Sept. 1884, aged ninety-nine years, six months and six days, son of Elijah-Strong and Lucy (Clark) Hollister.

Marinus-Willettt Hollister resided in Sunderland, for ten years in Troy, N. Y., and then in 1818 made his home in Manchester, Vt. He drove the Troy-Rutland stage, and at the close of the War of 1812 drove the stage which brought the news of peace to Manchester, the stage being decorated with evergreens, and on its sides in great white letters was the word, "Peace."
