The HERALD Cook Book has made its appearance here and fine living is expected now.

We have a private school this winter and B. C. Green of Traverse City is the teacher, and I am glad to say that we are all well pleased with him and his teaching. He has about 20 scholars of all nationalities. They all learn well and spelling schools are commencing.

It will be remembered that Capt. W. W. Gordon and Capt. W. N. Burton at La Crosse built a dock to

ship gravel to Chicago last spring, but only shipped one cargo; but they are not at all discouraged, for they are getting out spiles and caps to build a much larger dock this spring. As gravel is plenty, we hope to see a good business.

We are surprised at your 25, 30 and 35 degrees below zero. Why, the South Manitou people would freeze standing. I have lived here 25 years and the coldest I ever knew was 13 below zero. That was the 29th of Feb., 1884, at 8 in the morning. The coldest day this winter so far was Feb. 11th at 8 o'clock in the morning, when it was 11 below zero. We have a splendid bridge from the island to Glen Arbor, the nicest walking you ever saw. There would be no trouble to come to Traverse City with team. We get rail twice per week, on foot of course.
