

TEN IN DANGER AS ICE HOLDS 2 BOATS

Lake Mail Craft Trapped

LELAND, Mich., March 24.—(AP)—A mail boat with four men aboard and a coast guard boat with a crew of six were held fast in the ice four miles off North Manitou Island to-night after an all-day effort to break loose.

Fears were expressed here for the

safety of the ten men, who were without food or fuel. Heavy blocks of ice were moving slowly about the craft. The greatest danger was that a wind would come up, crushing the small boats between cakes of ice.

The mail boat left North Manitou Island this morning for Leland in command of Capt. Tracy Grosvenor, who carried as passengers Eli Firestone, manager of a Manitou orchard; Chris Neilson, Norfolk, Mich., and a man named Peterson from Ludington, Mich.

DETROIT, March 24.—(AP)—Lovell U. Grant, jr., decorated aviation hero of the World War, added another thrilling chapter to his life's story yesterday and today while being tossed about in Lake St. Clair in his 50-foot yawl, the Nahma.

Rescue of Grant and his one-man crew, Irving Daly, 19, was effected late today by a customs border patrol boat after nine airplanes had failed to locate the yawl, "missing" since 8 p. m. Saturday.

As Frank McGrath, assistant chief of the border patrol, stepped to the jib of the Nahma, the jib broke, and McGrath and Daly went into the water. The officer was pulled in by Joseph O'Rourke of the customs boat, while the youth, who cannot swim, grabbed a tow rope and saved his life.
